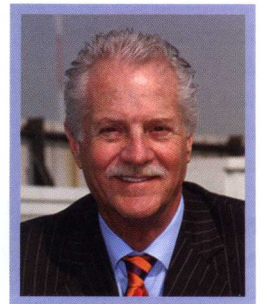
“In one sense, the big projects have slowed down as budgets haven’t allowed for new buildings to be built,” said Rosenberg. “A larger portion of our work has been renovations and additions. On the other hand, we’re excited about the work we’ve done with firms across the country and internationally.”

Closer to home, DMR has been working on sustainable designs, such as Middlesex County College’s new David B. Crabiell Hall, a two-story 36,383 square foot building featuring classrooms, computer labs, administrative offices, a culinary demonstration lab, kitchen facilities and meeting rooms.

The firm’s billings are split between commercial, private industry and public work for state agencies and municipalities, and the mix hasn’t changed substantially over the last two years.

DMR Architects, which is celebrating its 20th year, is currently working on the New

known as the Barge Club for redevelopment as a riverfront park that will include waterfront promenade, picnic areas, and educational signage identifying the natural and historic aspects of the park.
